- U.S. Travel Association (USTA), a national non-profit association representing 1,350 member travel industry organizations that seeks to leverage the collective strength of those who benefit from travel to grow their business beyond what they can do individually
- American Indian and Alaska Native Tourism Association (AIANTA), a national non-profit association of Native American tribes and tribal businesses, organized in 1999, to define, introduce, grow and sustain American Indian, Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian tourism that honors traditions and values. The association is made up of member tribes from six regions: Eastern, Plains, Midwest, Southwest, Pacific and Alaska.
- Native Hawaiian Hospitality Association (NaHHA), a non-profit organization that perpetuates an authentic spirit of aloha and Hawaiian culture in hospitality industry planning, promotion and product development. NaHHA services corporate and community initiatives through project management, consulting, training and facilitation.
- Southeast Tourism Society (STS), a non-profit organization dedicated to the promotion of tourism in Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas, North Carolina, Florida, South Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, Kentucky, Virginia, Louisiana and West Virginia.
- Alaska Federation of Natives (AFN), the largest statewide Native membership organization in Alaska, which includes 151 federally-recognized tribes, 134 village corporations, 12 regional corporations, and 12 regional nonprofit and tribal consortiums.
- Governor's Interstate Indian Council (GIIC), a national membership association of state Governors and state tribal relations and Native affairs officers, dedicated to enhancing relationships between tribes, states and the federal government; preservation of traditional Indian culture, language and values; and supportive of socioeconomic development aimed at tribal self-sufficiency.
- Coalition of Large Land Based Tribes (COLT), a coalition of tribes with large reservations, Treaties and large populations including: the Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara Nation; the Oglala Sioux Tribe; the Crow Tribe of Montana; the Navajo Nation; the Sisseton Wahpeton Sioux Tribe; the Blackfeet Tribe of Montana; the Rosebud Sioux Tribe; the Spokane Tribe of Washington; the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe; and the Ute Tri
- Native American Contractors Association (NACA), a national non-profit trade association that advocates on behalf of Tribes, Alaska Native Corporations, and Native Hawaiian Organization on issues relevant to native business enterprises in the field of federal contracting.
- National Congress of American Indians (NCAI) was established in 1944 and is the oldest and largest national organization of American Indian and Alaska Native tribal governments
- Kentucky Native American Heritage Commission (KNAHC) is education and preservation of the culture. We define our activities to include preservation of the past, recognition of the present and creating the platform for the future through education and legislation, when possible, recognizing that our activities today impact the future of our People in the Commonwealth of Kentucky and beyond.
