Agua Caliente History


- Members of the Agua Caliente Band of Cahuilla Indians and their ancestors have lived in the Coachella Valley for centuries
- The early Cahuilla people were known to have complex communities in the Palm, Murray, Andreas, Tahquitz, Snow Creek and Chino Canyons




Agua Caliente History

- The Agua Caliente Reservation was established on May 15, 1876 by President Ulysses S. Grant

 The Reservation was expanded by President Rutherford B. Hayes on Sept. 29, 1877



- The Agua Caliente Reservation is laid out in a checkerboard pattern
- The U.S. Government gave oddnumbered sections to the railroad to spur rail growth in the 1870s
- The Tribe and its members are the largest single landowner in Palm Springs
- The Tribe exercises sovereign authority over lands of the reservation through land use agreements with the four local jurisdictions


