#### **Community Assistance Programs**

The National Park Service assists community groups and the public with historic preservation, recreation and improved access to public lands, natural resource conservation, and education and stewardship. Community assistance programs of the National Park Service empower local organizations to advance preservation and conservation work in rural and urban communities across the country from Davis, West Virginia, to Sacramento, California. These programs serve as economic drivers, transforming underutilized places into community assets that ultimately enhance quality of life and boost local economies through tourism and job creation. Most of the programs leverage non-federal funds and long-term support from partner organizations.

## **HISTORIC PRESERVATION**

1966 – National Historic Preservation Act

Established federal and state programs to implement historic preservation

State Historic Preservation Offices (SHPOs)

Tribal Historic Preservation Offices (THPOs) – established 1992

Established National Register of Historic Places


1976 – Amendment establishes <u>Historic Preservation Fund</u>

Funded by royalties accumulated from the leasing and production of natural resources from federal & Indian lands onshore & in the Outer Continental Shelf

- Maximum annual authorized amount = \$150 million
- Funds must be Congressionally appropriated annually

FY20 appropriation = \$118.7 million



#### **Save America's Treasures**

#### What is it?

• Funds preservation work on nationally significant historic properties and collections

#### What does nationally significant mean?

- The property or collection must be:
  - Listed as a National Historic Landmark;
  - · Listed in the National Register of Historic Places; or
  - A collection of national significance.

#### How are projects evaluated?

· By national significance; severity of threat; effectiveness and feasibility

## How much funding did the program receive in FY20?

• \$16M

#### Who can apply?

Includes Federally-recognized Indian Tribes, Alaska Natives, and Native Hawaiian Organizations

#### **Historic Revitalization Grants**

#### What is it?

 Supports rehabilitation of historic properties and economic development in rural communities

## What kinds of properties are eligible?

- The property must be:
  - Listed in the National Register of Historic Places or determined eligible for listing
  - Located within rural communities with populations less than 50,000

## Who can apply, and how must funds be used?

- States (SHPOs), Tribes (THPOs), Certified Local Governments, and non-profits can apply
- Grant funds must then be sub-granted to organizations within their jurisdiction

## How much funding did the program receive in FY20?

• \$7.5M

### What kind of work is funded?

 This grant program supports the survey, inventory, and designation of historic properties associated with communities currently underrepresented in the National Register of Historic Places and among National Historic Landmarks.

## Who can apply, and how must funds be used?

 States (SHPOs), Tribes (THPOs), Federally Recognized Tribes, Alaska Native Groups, Native Hawaiian Organizations, and Certified Local Gov.

## How much funding did the program receive in FY20?

• \$750,000


